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



Cynthia A. O'Connell, MSS, MHA, FACHE Medical Center Associate Director West Palm Beach VA Medical Center



What is your current role and how long have you served in it?

For nearly 3 years, I have been the Associate Director/Chief Operating Officer (COO) for the West Palm Beach Veterans Administration Medical Center (VAMC).

What prompted you to pursue a career in healthcare and, more specifically, with the VA?

I wanted to be in healthcare since early childhood in Ireland, where there were few, if any, providers, and hardly any clinics in the rural areas where we lived. My education was focused on healthcare since the beginning, and my path to becoming a healthcare administrator was nurtured during the early days of my military career both as a Medical Service Corps officer, and through graduate education opportunities in the civilian sector. I was offered and selected for several defining positions that supported my career choices as I moved up the military career ladder in healthcare executive leadership. After completing 35 years in uniform and retiring from military service in 2016, I found myself looking for an opportunity to continue my passion of healthcare while still serving my fellow veterans, and the VA was the obvious choice. Where better to continue to serve my brothers- and sisters-in-arms from all areas of military service? So, I sought out a VA Medical Center leadership position because I love working with our patients in our hospitals. Our VA population is very special and unique - these are the men and women who served our country when they heard the call. Less than 1% of our population chooses to serve our country in uniform. I am very humbled to serve those who have served our nation!

How long have you been a member of ACHE and ACHE of South Florida?

I became a member of ACHE in 1985, a Diplomate in 2006, and a Fellow in 2007. As I have moved around a bit during my career, I have belonged to several ACHE Chapters, including Central California, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Central Texas, Northern California, the National Capital Region, and Germany. I moved to Florida in late 2018 and joined ACHE of South Florida at that time.

How has being a member and a Fellow contributed to your success and the care that you provide to our veterans?

ACHE has always been regarded as the Gold Standard of healthcare executive professionalism and Board Certification, especially within the military healthcare profession. That is how it was presented to me as a fledgling healthcare officer in 1985, when I was first approached by my mentor, who was also a member of ACHE. It was and is a keenly sought-after credential and not easily met. Often, when seeking healthcare executive positions, when everything else is equal, having the ACHE credential is the preferential deciding factor. As members and Fellows, belonging to such a highly esteemed professional organization such as ACHE means we have set a high standard of excellence for ourselves, both ethically and professionally, and speaks to the high quality of care we strive to provide for our patients.

Anything else you want to share about you, membership and/or your role?

ACHE has always been part of my professional upbringing and advancement. It has been the credential that has opened doors to multiple professional opportunities and has been an advantage in close selections. I have always enjoyed the camaraderie with my ACHE colleagues at ACHE-sponsored events all over the US and Europe because it provided additional practical operational perspectives, avenues for networking, and opportunities I might not have considered if not for those seminars, clusters, or local get-togethers. Being part of ACHE has kept me centered and up-to-date with healthcare no matter where I found myself in the world practicing my craft. It has been, and continues to be, an indispensable organization for my continued development as a leader and life-long healthcare executive practitioner.



How long have you been with JHS and what roles have you held throughout your tenure?

Throughout the past 8 years, I have held several roles within Jackson Health System, including Director of Corporate Initiatives for Jackson Health System, Chief Operating Officer for Jackson South Medical Center and, currently, Senior VP and CEO for Jackson West Medical Center. I have also led and played a key role in various complex initiatives for the health system, including the trauma designation, STROKE, STEMMI and the expansion at Jackson South Medical Center, Department of Corrections Health, and COVID testing and vaccinations for Miami-Dade County residents.

As the CEO of South Florida's newest hospital, what are you most proud of and what do you want the community to know about JWMC?

This is the first academic medical center in Doral and the first built-to-suit campus in Jackson Health System's network. As the first acute care hospital to open in South Florida in a decade, this comprehensive medical center was designed completely around the patient, including easy-to-navigate facilities, first-of-its-kind innovative technology, and passionately engaged caregivers who deliver a boutique and personalized experience for our patients and families.

JWMC is raising the bar when it comes to care. Patients and families are truly at the center, encouraged to serve as captain of their care and are involved every step of the way. Our patient satisfaction scores rank in the 97 percentile nationally which is remarkable for a new facility. These accomplishments, however, are the result of the collective skills and dedication from every member of the JWMC team. We have built a culture that is centered around inclusivity, engagement, and empowerment. We are intent on making every interaction – before, during and after – an amazing one.



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








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
